PRACTICE TEXT — CITY TREES

City trees do more than make a street look green. Their leaves create shade that can make sidewalks and nearby spaces more comfortable on hot days. Tree roots and the soil around them can slow and absorb some rainwater before it reaches storm drains. Trees also provide food, shelter, and nesting places for insects and birds. Because these benefits are different but connected, planting and caring for trees can make a neighborhood more comfortable and support local wildlife at the same time.

MAIN IDEA

City trees help neighborhoods by providing shade, managing some rainwater, and supporting wildlife.

DETAIL 1

Leaves provide shade that can make nearby outdoor spaces more comfortable on hot days.

DETAIL 2

Roots and surrounding soil can slow and absorb some rainwater before it reaches storm drains.

DETAIL 3

Trees provide food, shelter, and nesting places for insects and birds.
